### **Materials to Have for Every Session**





### **Daily Themes & Additional Materials Needed per Session**

#### Session 1 (July 12) - Dinosaurs in Time

- Yarn/ribbon/string
- O Cardboard (big enough for your adventurer to walk on) or sturdy paper/paper plate
- Optional experiment materials:
  - Graham crackers
  - Vanilla pudding (one snack pack should be enough)
  - Red food coloring (to turn the pudding red to model lava)
  - o Plate
  - Blue construction paper
  - Pangea worksheet at end of this document (please cut out continents ahead of lesson)





# Session 2 (July 13) – Digging Deep Oress like a paleontologist! (hat, jeans/cargo pants, t-shirt short or long sleeve, bandana, botts, socks) Square pan/plastic square container to bury items in Yarn or string Tape


- O Dirt or cloud dough (2 cup flour mixed with ¼ cup of oil baby oil or vegetable oil)
- Small toys or dinosaurs
- O Ruler
- O Toilet paper/paper towel/tissue paper/tissues
- Optional additional materials:
  - Garden tools
  - o Gloves
  - Bucket
  - Paint brush
  - Tweezers

## Session 3 (July 14) – Types of Dinosaurs

- Green construction paper (3 sheets)
- O Glue stick
- Tape
- Large marshmallows or a dry snack (goldfish, pretzels, etc.) that can be eaten

## Session 4 (July 15) – Making the Pieces Fit

- O Toilet paper tubes and paper towel tubes OR Q tips (enough supplies to make a miniature dinosaur skeleton out of)
- O Large piece of paper
- O Glue
- Small plate



# Session 5 (July 16) – Extinction

- Medium-sized rock
- O Square or rectangular container of dirt
- O Container of ice
- Small toys/dinosaurs
