### Daily Themes & Materials Needed per Session

#### Monday (August 9) – Jackson Pollock

- Paper
- Paint/Paint Brush

#### Tuesday (August 10) – Andy Goldsworthy

- Camera
  - Separate from the device you are on; you can borrow your parents phone or use a tablet, etc. If you don't have a camera accessible, you can draw the object.
- Natural materials (sticks, rocks, leaves, ice cubes, etc.)
- Notebook or paper (to write your observations on)
- Writing utensil (pencil, colored pencils, etc.)

#### Wednesday (August 11) – Calder Lesson

- Wire
- Hanger (wire preferred but any will do)
- String/yarn
- Construction Paper (to cut shapes out of)
- Scissors
- Hole punch
- Markers, crayons, or colored pencils (something to color with)
- Glue Stick
  - Optional: foam shapes



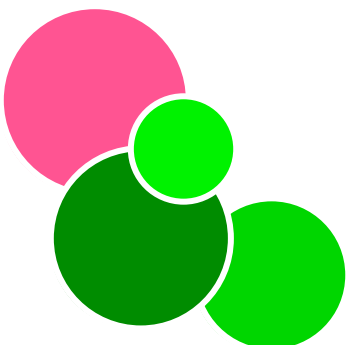
### Thursday (August 12) – Yayoi Kusama

- Poster board or cardboard
- Construction paper
- Scissors
- Paint, markers, or colored pencils
  - Optional: a stencil to make circles

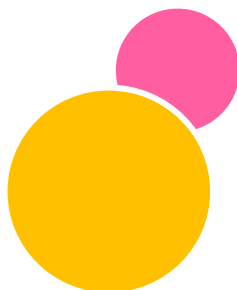
### Friday (August 13) – Graham/Cave Lesson

- Scrap pieces of fabric
