We humans have been playing music for over 40,000 years and images of us with our instruments abound from Neolithic times. From intimate family portraits to massive historical, religious and allegorical artworks, music and musicians are embedded throughout the history of art. Many of these works contain secret codes that contemporary viewers would have understood. We interpret gorgeous paintings by artists such as Holbein, Vermeer, Caravaggio and Hogarth while experiencing the music that would have been performed at the time.
