
A Brief Chronology of Scottish-English Relations


- 55-54 BC Julius Caesar invades Britain but withdraws
- 43 AD Emperor Claudius conquers much of southern Britain
- 84 Romans defeat Caledonians at the Battle of Mons Graupius
- 122 Hadrian's Wall built
- 143Antonine Wall built
- 410 Roman legions withdraw from Britain
- c. 450 Angles and Saxons begin settling in eastern Britain
- c. 516 Battle of Mount Badon (victory for Arthur?)
- 547 Angles capture the fortress at Bamburgh and found the kingdom of Bernicia
- 563 Saint Columba founds monastery at Iona and evangelizes the Picts
- 597 St. Augustine of Canterbury evangelizes Kent
- 638 Northumbrians capture Edinburgh
- 664 Synod of Whitby: Northumbria adopts the Roman date of Easter
- 685 Picts defeat Northumbrians at the Battle of *Nechtansmere*, halting northern expansion of Northumbria
- 839 Kenneth MacAlpin unites the Picts and Scots
- 937 English defeat Scots at Battle of Brunanburh
- 973 King Edgar the Peaceable accepts tribute from all the kings of Britain
- 1040-57 Reign of Macbeth
- 1058Malcolm III proclaimed king
- 1066 Norman Conquest of England
- 1124 David I introduces feudal landholding to Scotland
- 1174 William I (the Lion) swears allegiance to Henry II of England
- 1292 Edward I of England grants Scottish throne to John Balliol



1320	Declaration of Arbroath asserts Scottish independence of England
1328	Treaty of Northampton affirms Scottish independence
1495-97	Perkin Warbeck challenges the Tudor dynasty with Scottish support
1503	Marriage of James IV and Margaret Tudor
1513	English defeat Scots at Flodden; James IV is killed
1534	Act of Supremacy: Henry VIII declared head of the Church of England
1543	Mary, Queen of Scots is crowned
1547	Scots defeated at Battle of Pinkie
1548	Mary, Queen of Scots sent to France
1559-60	Mary, Queen of Scots reigns as Queen of France
1560	Scottish Parliament implements the Protestant Reformation
1561	Mary returns to Scotland
1565	Mary marries Lord Darnley
1566	Murder of Mary's secretary, David Riccio; birth of future James VI
1567	Murder of Darnley
1568	Mary flees into exile in England and is imprisoned
1587	Execution of Mary Queen of Scots
1588	Defeat of the Spanish Armada
1603	Union of the crowns between Scotland and England
1638	Scottish Covenanters rebel against Charles I
1649	Execution of Charles I
1688	Glorious Revolution deposes James II and installs William and Mary


1689	Jacobite rising; Jacobites win at Killiecrankie but lose at Dunkeld
1692	Glencoe Massacre
1698-1700	Darien Scheme fails to establish a Scottish colony on the Isthmus of Panama
1707	Act of Union between Scotland and England
1715	Jacobite rising under the Old Pretender
1745-46	Jacobite rising in Scotland and England under the Young Pretender
1746	Act of Proscription (Highland Dress Act)
1776	Publication of Adam Smith's Wealth of Nations
1782	Repeal of the Highland Dress Act
1800	Act of Union with Ireland
1833	Visit of George IV to Scotland organized by Sir Walter Scott
1857	Sepoy Rebellion in India
1934	Foundation of the Scottish National Party
1950	The Stone of Destiny is stolen from Westminster Abbey by Scottish nationalists but subsequently returned
1997	Referenda establish a Welsh National Assembly and a Scottish Parliament; Stone of Destiny returned to Edinburgh Castle
1999	Scottish Parliament sits for the first time since 1707
2014	Scottish voters reject independence
2016	UK voters approve Brexit; Scotland and Northern Ireland vote Remain
