April 11: Modernism Smashes Old Idols

We begin by spotlighting the work of 19th century composer Louise Farrenc who is only now receiving the attention she deserves. We also explore the extraordinary gifts of Lili Boulanger, taken from us far too early. Then onwards to mover, shaker, and trouble-maker Jean Cocteau: "Enough of clouds, waves, aquariums, water sprites, and nocturnal scents; what we need is a music of the earth, everyday music." With those inflammatory words, he relegated Debussy to the musical history books and ushered in the reign of eccentric genius Erik Satie and his group of rambunctious protégés *Les Six*, who included Darius Milhaud, Germaine Tailleferre and Francis Poulenc. Delicious satire and irreverence will be also provided by Jacques Ibert. We cannot leave French music without a brief discussion of the great Olivier Messiaen, whose *Quartet for the End of Time* is a deeply moving 20th-century landmark. We finish by celebrating the mighty French organ tradition with Maurice Duruflé's *Veni Creator* and the fabulous *Toccata* by Charles-Marie Widor.
