ART NOUVEAU VOCABULARY

aedicule—small temple or shrine, the term is used for Guimard's covered Metro entrances, of which there are two surviving

amboyna—burl of the narra tree (*Pterocarpus indicus*)

applied arts—art made for practical purpose (e.g. woodcarving, ceramics, metalwork etc). Art Nouveau rejected the distinction between fine and applied art

baroque pearl—an irregularly shaped pearl

blank—an undecorated object, prepared or molded and ready for further ornamentation

cabochon—stone with a polished rounded surface, no facets

cast glass—glass molded and used as a jewelry element

cells (cloisons)—individual wells in metalwork for placing liquid enamel

champlevé—enamel method in which the metal back is engraved and enamel fills the low areas

channel set—metalwork where stones are set in a row under a thin rim

chasing--metal decoration where the metal is manipulated using a hammer and a punch

citrine—semi-precious stone a yellow-brown quartz

cloisonné—enamel method in which cells are made of thin wire on a metal back and the enamel fills each cell.

collier de chien--Dog collar—a choker necklace

color lithograph---a lithograph where a separate stone was used for each color and the print goes through the press separately for each stone/color. The main challenge is to keep the images aligned so registration marks help

Cymric—Liberty line of silver

diadem—a crown, specifically a royal headband, usually in an open work style

en tremblant—a brooch or other ornament made with hinges, making the object quiver when the wearer moved

faience—a glazed earthenware

favrile—a kind of hand-blown iridescent glass by Tiffany. Favrile derived from the French for hand-made. Used in Tiffany productions like stained glass windows, amps, mosaics etc as well as blown glassware

Gesamtkunstwerk--a total work of art where the building, its furnishings and its setting form a conceptual whole.

gouache—opaque watercolor

guilloché—an enameling technique in which metal is machine engraved in pattern and then enamel is applied

harling—an kind of exterior plaster where stone chips or gravel are thrown into it

historicism—in art the use of historical styles, ornamentation or motifs (e.g. Rococo, Gothic, Renaissance) from the past, often in eclectic combination.

Jugendstil—youth style—German/Austrian art nouveau

lapis lazuli—rich blue opaque semi-precious stone

marquetry—the decoration with elaborate inlays of mother-of-pearl, ivory and other woods in wood veneers on furniture

martelé—hand-worked silver which shows the hammering marks

mother-of-pearl—the nacreous substance inside an oyster shell

narra—wood (*Pterocarpus indicus*)—rose or reddish wood variegated with yellow, scented, hard and heavy but easily worked, used especially in cabinetry

pate de verre—glass paste—glass that is ground into a paste, molded, and then melted in the mold

pectoral—jeweled ornament worn on the chest

Plique à jour—an enamel method in which the cell is backless, allowing light to pass through

scarab—a stone or faience beetle used in ancient Egypt as a talisman, ornament, and a symbol of resurrection

shagreen-shark skin

staff—a building material—intended to be temporary—made of plaster applied over wire frame, horsehair etc.

symbolism—style in literature and art which was preoccupied with the symbolic or spiritual world (dreams, visions, nightmares, the occult, the erotic, fantasies).

Tudric—Liberty line of pewter

vellum—animal skin used in making books or applied to furniture

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
