A John Steinbeck Timeline

27 February **1902**: Steinbeck born in Salinas, California

1919-25: Attended classes at Stanford University, leaving without taking a degree.

1925: traveled by freighter from Los Angeles to New York City; worked as a construction laborer and, briefly, for the *New York American*

1926-28: lived in Lake Tahoe, California and worked as a caretaker for a summer home.

1929: publication of first novel, *Cup of Gold*, by McBride (New York).

14 January **1930**: marries Carol Henning. October, meets Edward F. Ricketts, marine biologist, philosopher, longtime friend.

1932: *The Pastures of Heaven*.

1933: *To A God Unknown*.

1935: *Tortilla Flat*; beginning of lifelong friendship with editor Pascal Covici.

1936: *In Dubious Battle*.

1937: *Of Mice and Men*; first trip to Europe and Russia; *The Red Pony*

April **1938**: *Their Blood Is Strong*.

April **1939**: *The Grapes of Wrath*

1940: film of *The Grapes of Wrath*.

1941: separated from Carol; Fall, moves to New York City with singer Gwyndolyn Conger; December, *Sea of Cortez*.

1943: marries Gwyn Conger in New Orleans; June-October, Europe and North Africa as war correspondent for *New York Herald Tribune*.

1944: birth of first son, Thom.

1945: *Cannery Row*.

1946: birth of second son, John IV.

1947: novel, *The Wayward Bus*; tour of Russia with photographer Robert Capa, for the *New York Herald Tribune*; November, *The Pearl*.

1948: *A Russian Journal*; May, Ed Ricketts killed in automobile accident; August, divorced by Gwyn

1950: novella, *Burning Bright*.

1950: marries third wife, Elaine Anderson Scott.

1951: *The Log from the Sea of Cortez*.

1952: *East of Eden*.

1954: *Sweet Thursday*.

1955: purchases a summer home in Sag Harbor, Long Island.

1957: *The Short Reign of Pippin IV*.

1958: *Once There Was a War*.

February - October **1959:** Discover Cottage in Somerset; travels in England and Wales, researching background for a modern English version of Malory's *Morte Darthur* (1485).

1960: the *Travels with Charley* tour of America.

1961: *The Winter of Our Discontent*.

1962: *Travels with Charley*; 25 October, Steinbeck is awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature.

1963: travels to Scandinavia, Eastern Europe, and the Soviet Union on United States Information Agency cultural tour.

1964: presented Medal of Freedom by President Lyndon B. Johnson.

1966: *America and Americans*.

December **1966** - January **1967:** extensive fact-finding visit to South Vietnam.

20 December **1968:** dies of arteriosclerosis in New York City.

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
