## KEY EVENTS

1450: First Battle of St Alban's

Marguerite of Anjou supports Henry VI

**Cecily Neville supports Richard Duke of York** 

1460: Battle of Wakefield

Richard killed, Cecily becomes widow, Edward takes up fight

Marguerite celebrates victory

1461: Battle of Towton

Marguerite seen as leading force for HenryVI

**Cecily supports Edward and Yorkists** 

Jacquetta and family support Lancastrians (until after the battle)

Yorkists prevail and Cecily becomes most important woman at court

1464: With Jacquetta as witness, Elizabeth Woodville marries Edward IV

Cecily resents losing influence, Elizabeth Woodville and family gain influence

1470-71: Rebellions against Edward IV result in Battle of Barnet

Marguerite accepts help of Warwick and Clarence to overturn Edward IV's reign

Margaret of York and Cecily of York work to reunite Edward and George

Elizabeth Woodville and children in sanctuary while Marguerite restored as Queen

Margaret Beaufort takes son Henry Tudor to court to meet Henry VI

After Battle of Tewkesbury, Marguerite's forces defeated and she is taken into custody; her

husband and son are killed

Elizabeth Woodville is restored as Queen, she and new son leave sanctuary

A year later, Anne Neville marries Richard Duke of Gloucester

1483: Edward IV dies

Elizabeth Woodville's marriage declared void, Elizabeth of York now illegitimate; they retreat

into sanctuary

Anne Neville crowned Queen alongside Richard III; Margaret of York carries train

Over next months, Elizabeth Woodville and Margaret Beaufort potentially collaborate

Anne Neville dies

1485: Battle of Bosworth

Margaret Beaufort sees son crowned Henry VII

Elizabeth of York becomes Queen of England

Margaret of York/Burgundy supports rebellions against Henry VII

Margaret Beaufort dies in 1509 shortly after Henry VIII is crowned King of England
