Women and Art in Eighteenth-Century France

Sheriff, Mary. Moved by Love: Inspired Artists and Deviant Women in Eighteenth-Century France. University of Chicago Press, 2004.

A dense, penetrating study of the ways in which notions of artistic creativity and inspiration in eighteenth-century France were shaped by contemporary discourses on women, gender, and sexuality.

Spies-Gans, Paris. A Revolution on Canvas: The Rise of Women Artists in Britain and France, 1760-1830.

A major study of the rise of women artists in London and Paris at the end of the eighteenth century. Using quantitative methods, it challenges the long-held belief that few women worked as professional artists during this time. Special attention is paid to women history painters. Vallayer-Coster is discussed only in passing.

Anne Vallayer-Coster

Kahng, Eik, ed. *Anne Vallayer-Coster: Painter to the Court of Marie Antoinette*. Dallas: Dallas Museum of Art; New Haven: Yale University Press, 2002.

This exhibition catalogue remains the only comprehensive English-language Vallayer-Costser. Includes essays on the artist's biography, her relationship to Chardin, her patrons and collectors, the status of women artists in eighteenth-century France, and her painting technique.

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Élisabeth Vigée Le Brun

Baillio, Joseph, Katharine Baetjet, and Paul Lang, eds. *Vigée Le Brun*. New York: Metropolitan Museum of Art; New Haven: Yale University Press, 2016.

The catalogue for the most recent exhibition on Vigée Le Brun.

Sheriff, Mary D. *The Exceptional Woman: Elisabeth Vigée-Lebrun and the Cultural Politics* of Art. Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 1996.

A classic feminist study of Vigée Le Brun. Explore the contradictory position of "womanartist" in the moral, philosophical, professional, and medical debates about women in eighteenth-century France.

Vigée Le Brun, Élisabeth. *The Memoirs of Élisabeth Vigée-Le Brun*. Translated by Sîan Evans. London: Camden Press, 1989.

Written in 1835, Vigée Le Brun's lively memoirs, though not always accurate, are filled with gossipy anecdotes and impressions of her famous friends and clients.

Adélaïde Labille-Guiard

Auricchio, Laura. *Adélaïde Labille-Guiard: Artist in the Age of Revolution*. Los Angeles: Getty Press, 2009.

The first English-language study of Labille-Guiard, exploring the influence of gender and the French Revolution on her career.

Quinn, Bridget. Portrait of a Woman: Art, Rivalry, and Revolution in the Life of Adélaïde Labille-Guiard Hardcover. San Francisco: Chronicle Books, 2024.

A lively biography intended for a general audience.
