 - b. During the Revolution: Oath of the Tennis Court, 1789- (Musée Carnavalet, Paris);
 Death of Marat, 1793 (Royal Museums of Fine Arts, Brussels)
 - c. Prison and after: Portraits, 1795; Intervention of the Sabine Women, 1796-99 (Louvre)
 - d. Napoleon Revolutionary Hero to Dictator: Napoleon Crossing the Alps, 1801
 (Chateau de Malmaison); Coronation of Napoleon in 1804, 1808 (Louvre); Emperor
