VOCABULARY

allée—in a formal garden a long "alley" of trees or shrubs apse—in Palladian terms, a semi-circular termination of a room ashlar—a technique in stonework where blocks are smooth bay—one vertical segment of a facade enfilade—a straight-shot passage (and view) through several rooms

exedra—a semi-circular garden feature containing a seat folly—an ornamental structure in a garden or park which has no purpose but a shape that suggests it does e.g. a hermitage, a temple, a ruin etc.

eye-catcher—a garden ornament like a folly placed in a landscape to draw the eye

grisaille—a monochromatic painting in shades of grey ha-ha—a cut trench designed to keep out animals without interrupting the view from the house

Jacobethan style—20th century term for revival architecture which shows characteristics of both Elizabeth and Jacobean architecture

Palladian window—a tripartite window, center section higher and wider—based on Venetian exemplars piano nobile—noble floor or level—the chief reception and state rooms usually located on the first floor pietra dura—decorative inlay made of cut and polished pieces of stone

Prodigy house—modern term for Elizabethan mansions of prodigious size, tit for a royal visit


rustication--a technique in stonework with visible, rough surfaces

scagliola— is a composite substance imitating marble. screens passage—a corridor by the great hall created by an openwork screen, separating public and service spaces State rooms—a suite of rooms in a country house designed to impress, not for everyday living

trompe l'oeil painting—trick the eye in French—a illusionistic painting made to appear the real 3-D thing

veduta—Italian meaning view—a landscape painting, it may be topographical, realistic or a caprice

viewshed—modern term related to the preservation of a landscape for the sake of the view or for its historical significance



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
