


Components of the Wall System: Vallum, Ditch and Curtain Wall




Stanegate ("Stone Road"): pre-Wall Roman road.

Military Way: Roman road paralleling some sections of the Wall on the south side of the curtain.

Terms

Auxilia (Auxiliaries): non-citizen Roman troops raised from distinct regions of the Empire to support the legions.

Cohors (Cohort): an infantry force, ranging between 80 and 100 soldiers.

Ala (lit. "wing"): a cavalry force, ranging between 120 and 140 horsemen divided into *turmae* of horsemen.

Cohors Equitata: a mixed force of infantry (480-800) and cavalry (120-240).

Vicus: a settlement outside of a Roman fort; its residents were called *vicani*.
