While composers have frequently enjoyed exploring the macabre and Gothic horror, classical repertory is equally graced with gentler stories, some of which even end happily ever after. In this expansion of her traditional frisson-filled Halloween sortie through our creepiest music, Dr. Rachel Franklin takes a fanciful journey to understand how fantasy and folklore inspired some of our greatest classical creators.

British-born Franklin has been a featured speaker for organizations including the Library of Congress and NPR, exploring intersections among classical and jazz music, film scores, and the fine arts.
