- 1882 Edward Hopper born in Nyack NY
- 1883 Josephine Verstille Nivison born in Manhattan
- 1893 World's Columbian Exposition
- 1898 The Ten American Painters group founded
- 1899 Began art study at New York School of Art with Robert
- Henri, Kenneth Hayes Miller and Wm Merritt Chase
- 1906 The murder of Stanford White, Madison Square Garden
- 1906+-1910 Trips to Europe
- 1906 Stairway at 48 rue de Lille, Paris
- 1908 Exhibition of the Eight (aka The Ashcan School)
- 1910 Winslow Homer died Prout's Neck, ME
- 1912 Hopper first visited Gloucester; Jackson Pollock born
- 1913 The Armory Show; Hopper sold painting <u>Sailing</u>; Moved to Washington Square, Greenwich Village
- 1915 Hopper turned to etching; it and commercial jobs provide sole income
- 1916 Wm Merritt Chase died
- 1917 Hopper starts vacationing in Maine
- 1918 Designed Smash the Hun poster
- 1921 Night Shadows (etching)
- 1923 Hopper visits Gloucester and courts Josephine Nivison; <u>The Mansard Roof</u> sold to Brooklyn Museum for \$100
- 1924 Married Josephine V. Nivison; Hopper discontinues making prints; Frank Rehn becomes Hopper's dealer/gallerist
- 1925 Visited Santa Fe, NM; artist friend George Bellows died at 42 from acute appendicitis
- 1925 <u>House by the Railroad</u>
- 1927 Sale of <u>Two on the Aisle</u> for \$1500; Hopper bought first automobile, a Dodge
- 1927 Automat and Drug Store. Robert Henri died
- 1929 Chop Suey and Lighthouse at 2 Lights
- 1930 Jo and Edward Hopper begin to split their time between Cape Cod and NYC
- 1931 <u>Tables for Ladies</u> entered Metropolitan Museum of Art
- 1932 New York Movie

- 1933 Ryder's House
- 1933 Century of Progress World's Fair held Chicago; Major retrospective of Hopper work at MoMA
- 1934 Using Jo's inheritance, The Hoppers built house-studio at South Truro, MA
- 1936 <u>Cape Cod Afternoon</u>
- 1938 Compartment C, Car 293
- 1939 NY World's Fair held; Bridle Path
- 1939 Ground Swell, Pretty Penny and Cape Cod Evening
- 1940 Office at Night and Gas
- 1941 World War II begins
- 1942 Hopper's Nighthawks purchased by Chicago Art Institute
- 1943 Whitney Museum mounted Hopper retrospective
- 1943 The Hoppers visit Saltillo, Mexico; Hopper painted <u>Hotel</u> <u>Lobby</u>
- 1946 Film Noir classic Deadline at Dawn
- 1948 Much of the year lost to ill health; Andrew Wyeth painted Christina's World
- 1950s ill health begins to plague Hopper
- 1950 Hopper given an honorary doctorate from School of
- Chicago Art Institute; Cape Cod Morning
- 1953 The Metropolitan Museum purchased only Hopper oil of that year: Office in a small city
- 1955 Hotel Window
- 1956 Six months' visit to Pacific Palisades CA; Jackson Pollock killed in auto accident
- 1958 Artist friend Guy Pène du Bois died
- 1959 Hopper oral history interview with John Morse
- 1960 Alfred Hitchcock's Psycho
- 1962 Andy Warhol began Campbell's Soup can series
- 1963 <u>Sun in an Empty Room</u>
- 1965 Death of Hopper's sister Marion; Painted final work <u>Two</u> <u>Comedians</u>
- 1967 Edward Hopper died in Greenwich Village
- 1968 Josephine Nivison Hopper died; Hopper estate of paintings and ledgers given to Whitney Museum of American Art, NYC
